Olympic Insignia Protection Act 1987 ('the Act') of the protected olympic expressions described in the schedule to this security;

- (b) the objector has notified the Chief Executive Officer of Customs (in this security called 'the Chief Executive Officer') in writing, pursuant to section 52 of the Act, that they object to the importation of goods manufactured outside Australia and having applied to those goods an olympic expression listed in the schedule overleaf;
- (c) the objector has requested the Chief Executive Officer to seize any such goods, under subsection 54(2) of the Act, if imported;
- (d) before taking action under subsection 54(2) or permitting an officer to take action under that subsection the Chief Executive Officer, in pursuance of subsection 54(3), has required the objector to give this security.

The objector shall, upon a demand made by the Chief Executive Officer, forthwith reimburse the Commonwealth for all expenses incurred by it by virtue of any action taken by the Chief Executive Officer in relation to the goods under the Act. This bond shall remain in full force until it is discharged in reimbursing the Commonwealth in the above matter.
