



## AUSTRALIAN CUSTOMS DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2006/11

### Anti-Dumping Investigation

#### Certain mobile garbage bins exported from Malaysia

#### REVISION TO LEVEL OF SECURITIES

The Australian Customs Service (Customs) commenced an investigation into the alleged dumping of certain mobile garbage bins exported to Australia from Malaysia on 31 October 2005.

The investigation concerns Mobile Garbage Bins (MGBs), whether exported assembled or unassembled, of 120 litre and 240 litre nominal capacities, including but not limited to MGBs meeting European Standard EN840. MGBs typically consist of a bin body, bin lid, two wheels, an axle, lid pins, and in some cases a bin divider. The imported body component (with or without a limited number of other components) has also been investigated. MGBs in other nominal sizes (e.g. 80 litre, 140 litre and 360 litre) have been excluded from the investigation. The goods are classified to tariff subheading 3924.90.00 in Schedule 3 of the *Customs Tariff Act 1995* and statistical code 09. The applicants for the publication of a dumping duty notice are Nylex Limited and SULO MGB Australia Pty Ltd.

In accordance with s. 269TD of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act) Customs made a Preliminary Affirmative Determination (PAD) on 27 February 2006 that there appeared to be sufficient grounds for the publication of a dumping duty notice in respect of the goods. In reaching the PAD, Customs found that the dumping has caused material injury to the Australian industry producing like goods in the form of price undercutting, price suppression, price depression, lost sales volume, lost market share, reduced profits and profitability, reduced return on investment and an underutilisation of production capacity.

In order to prevent material injury occurring to the Australian industry while the investigation continues, Customs decided to require and take securities in respect of interim dumping duty that may become payable in respect of the goods from Malaysia entered for home consumption on or after 27 February 2006. The PAD and decision to impose the securities was advised in Australian Customs Dumping Notice No. 2006/07 and *The Australian* on 27 February 2006.

Customs has revised the level of securities to be taken in respect of the goods exported from Malaysia and entered for home consumption on or after 18 April 2006. The imported body component is no longer subject to securities. Bona fide importers may obtain details of the revised level of securities from the Regional Dumping Liaison Officers.

Particulars of the revised dumping margins established and the method used to establish those margins are set out below:

Exporter	Dumping Margins	Method to Establish Dumping Margin
Schaefer Systems International Pte Ltd	6.21%	Comparison of weighted average export prices with weighted average normal values over the investigation period
Other exporters	6.21%	Comparison of weighted average export prices with weighted average normal values over the investigation period
