



AUSTRALIAN CUSTOMS DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2006/16

Amendment to the notice in relation to the expected expiry of anti-dumping measures applicable to flexible slabstock polyols

On 21 April 2006 the Australian Customs Service (Customs) published a notice in *The Australian* in relation to the expiry of anti-dumping measures applying to flexible slabstock polyols exported from the Republic of Korea, Singapore and the United States of America. This notice invited those persons as specified at section 269ZHB(1)(b) of the *Customs Act 1901* to apply to Customs for the continuation of the anti-dumping measures by 20 June 2006.

The notice incorrectly identified Japan as being subject to these anti-dumping measures. However, there are no anti-dumping measures applicable to flexible slabstock polyols exported from Japan.

Below is the corrected version of the expiry of anti-dumping measures notice. Please note, all of the details other than the reference to Japan remain the same.

Flexible slabstock polyols from the Republic of Korea, Singapore and the United States of America - expiry of Anti-Dumping Measures

The Australian Customs Service, in accordance with section 269ZHB(1) of the *Customs Act 1901* (the Act), advises that anti-dumping measures on flexible slabstock polyols exported from the Republic of Korea, Singapore and the United States of America are due to expire on 27 April 2007.

The measures were initially imposed on 27 April 2002 by the Minister responsible for Customs following consideration of Trade Measures Report No.43.

Those persons as specified at section 269ZHB(1)(b) of the Act are invited to apply to Customs for the continuation of the anti-dumping measures. The application must be in writing, be in an approved form, contain such information that the form requires and be signed in the manner indicated in the form. Applications must be lodged by 20 June 2006.

The application must provide evidence addressing whether there appear to be reasonable grounds for asserting that the expiration of the anti-dumping measures to which the application relates might lead, or might be likely to lead, to a continuation of, or a recurrence of, the material injury that the measures are intended to prevent.

If an application is received that complies with the prescribed requirements, Customs must undertake an inquiry and report to the Minister within 155 days (or by such later date as the Minister may allow in accordance with section 269ZHI of the Act). Customs will publish a notice advising the commencement of such an inquiry.

If no application is received by Customs within the period specified above, the anti-dumping measures applying to flexible slabstock polyols exported from the Republic of Korea, Singapore and the United States of America will expire on 27 April 2007. Therefore on and from that day anti-dumping measures will no longer apply.
