



AUSTRALIAN CUSTOMS DUMPING NOTICE NO. 2006/22

Pineapple fruit exported from Thailand

Extension of time for the publication of statements of essential facts for the continuation inquiry and review of anti-dumping measures

The Minister for Justice and Customs has, under s. 269ZHI of the *Customs Act 1901*, extended the deadlines for the publication of statements of essential facts in relation to both the continuation inquiry and review of anti-dumping measures applying to pineapple fruit.

The deadlines have been extended to give the continuation and review the same publication and reporting timetable as that of the current anti-dumping investigation on pineapple fruit from the People's Republic of China and the Philippines, as there are a large number of interested parties common to both inquiries. Customs has also experienced delays in obtaining and verifying certain information required for the continuation inquiry and review.

The continuation inquiry and review commenced on 22 February 2006. Customs gave notice of the inquiry in *The Australian* newspaper and Australian Customs Dumping Notice 2006/05. A statement of essential facts was to be placed on the public record by 12 June 2006. The statement must now be placed on the public record by 29 July 2006.

The initiation of the investigation into alleged dumping of pineapple fruit from China and the Philippines commenced on 10 April 2006. Customs gave notice of the review in *The Australian* newspaper and Australian Customs Dumping Notice 2006/10. A statement of essential facts is still to be placed on the public record by 29 July 2006.

Interested parties are invited to make submissions in response to the statements of essential facts for the continuation and review within 20 days of their placement on the public record.
